# **PROGRAM BREAKDOWN**

A unique component of the program, identified by participants as a major benefit, is the mixing of a variety of projects at different stages of development in one cohort. A range of services were offered to all organizations, and each was able to work with our Resident Planner, Architect & Designer on the development of their projects, depending on the unique needs of each group.

- 5 organizations developed a pro forma
- 6 organizations developed a massing study
- 5 achieved a Planning milestone through the program
- All organizations were able to identify new project partners through the program
- All organizations reported that "The accelerator program helped address the challenges our organization faced in starting our SPRE development."
- All organizations reported that they are "confident in their next steps" in the development of their projects.

Organizations noted overall growth and development of each element of their projects from the beginning of the program to the end:

- Drafting a pro forma
- Understanding the cost implications of a project
- Identifying funding sources
- Developing a massing study and/or preliminary design
- Gaining support from a Board of Directors
- Achieving a Planning milestone
- Identifying potential partners


